Mobile phones brought into schools by children should be treated as "potentially offensive weapons" and banned from being used in the classroom, teachers said today.

Many schools have bowed to parental pressure for children to keep their mobiles on them in case of an emergency, despite mounting concern some pupils use them in class.

But the NASUWT teachers' union was today expected to demand that pupils be forced to hand them over to staff at the start of the day, for collection when they go home, even if that left parents infuriated.

Facebook and Bebo used to bully teachers

A group of school boys used the social networking sites Facebook and Bebo to abuse and threaten their teachers.

The police were called in after the discovery of the web pages devoted to harassing teachers at Forest School in Horsham, West Sussex.

The school has accused the pupils of causing "hurt and distress" to members of the teaching staff.

Siobhan Denning, the head teacher, said a group of "less than ten" culprits had been identified and the offending internet pages shut down.

"A very small number of pupils are exploiting the negative aspects of the internet and in doing so, hurting and distressing others," she added.

"We work hard with all members of our school community to foster an ethos of respect towards each other, and we all feel disappointed when a small number within our community let us down."

The school has refused to release exact details of the comments made online or identify the teachers targeted.

It is now monitoring Bebo and Facebook and warned anyone caught bullying online will face a police inquiry.

A POSH girls' school is embroiled in a sex scandal after police seized X-rated mobile phone footage of one of it's 13-year-old pupils.

Teachers at Holly Lodge alerted the authorities after the shock video showing the youngster having sex was flashed round the school in West Derby, Liverpool.

Stunned parents said the video - which also showed the mystery girl performing a sex act - had "done the rounds" at the school and across the city.

Boy is suspended after watching horror images on internet at school

A 16-YEAR-OLD boy was suspended from school after viewing graphic images of decapitation, mutilation and pornography on the internet.

The pupil at Coltness High, Wishaw, was excluded for two days after he was caught by the school's internet monitoring programme.

Today, his mother - after viewing the site - said more should be done to prevent teenagers accessing such gruesome sites in schools.

Wireless internet should be banned from schools, say teachers

Wireless internet use in schools should be suspended amid fears millions of children are being exposed to a risk of cancer, according to teachers' leaders.

The rush to install wi-fi may have a "significant impact" on young pupils, it is claimed.

It comes after claims last year, which have been disputed by officials, that wireless networks give off three times as much radiation as a typical mobile telephone mast.

Official guidance recommends a "precautionary" approach to buildings masts near schools, saying parents must be notified first.

Teachers say the same rules should be extended to wi-fi systems.

But architects suggest wireless networks are likely to become increasingly important for schools.

MPs say telephone companies should be doing more to protect children, by restricting what their phones receive.

Matt Whittaker, a design teacher at Barleigh College, in Loughborough, told a report of the Association of Teachers and Lecturers, that many children were viewing disgusting clips. He told the Leicester Mercury: "I was aware,

through my work at school, of the content youngsters had on their phones. I was appalled.

"There were beheadings, hardcore pornography and mutilations.

Teenagers may be using James Bond-style hidden earpieces to cheat in their exams, according to the Government's testing watchdog.

The Qualifications and Curriculum Authority is investigating concerns that students could be using the devices linked to mobile phones or MP3 players.

A Canadian company is openly promoting the invisible, wireless "micro spy earphone" to exam candidates around the world, The Times Educational Supplement reported.

The Toronto-based company, Examear, uses the advertising slogan: "Helping students succeed. Worldwide!"
